Even though she is never called with the name of Mary, the Mother of Jesus appears two times in the Gospel of John: at the beginning of the Wedding at Cana (Jn 2, 1-5), and at the end, at the foot of the Cross (Jn 19, 25-27). In both cases she represents the Old Testament which is waiting for the New one to arrive, and in both cases, she contributes to the arrival of the New One. Mary is the bond of union between what was before and that which will come afterwards. At Cana, she, the Mother of Jesus, symbol of the Old Testament, is the one who perceives the limitations of the Old Testament and takes the necessary steps in order to attain to the New one. At the foot of the Cross, she is at the side of the "Beloved Disciple". The Beloved Disciple is the community which grows around Jesus, he is the son born from the Old Testament. At the petition of Jesus, the son, the New Testament, receives Mary, the Old Testament, in his house. Both of them have to walk together. In fact, the New one cannot be understood without the Old one. The New one would have no basis, foundation. And the Old one without the New one would be incomplete: a tree without fruit.

Let us give thanks to Mary and to all who give quiet witness to our Lord and Saviour.

Ss John & Columba Jubilee: 2016 sees many celebrations due to take place in Rosyth. It is the centenary (100 years) since the foundation of the Garden City, the first houses being built, etc. It is also 90 years since the Church of Ss John & Columba's was built and 80 years of the foundation of the parish. Do we as a parish wish to mark these occasions? A meeting will be held on Tuesday 19th January after the 7pm Mass to discuss this subject.

Following baptism, the next sacrament that most Catholics receive is the Sacrament of Confession. The sacrament is actually known by several names: Confession signifies our need to go before God to seek to acknowledge our own failures; Penance emphasizes our attempt to make up for those sins through our

own contrition and pious acts; Reconciliation focuses on the repair of the broken relationship between God and His child. But there is another name for the sacrament, perhaps less common, and it is "the miracle of mercy." The Mercy of God works hand-in-hand with His Justice to wipe away our sins through the sacrifice of Jesus, who took the guilt for them and thus the necessary punishment. The mercy of God in Confession is a fountain of peace and love that brings us back close to God and to the community of the Church after we've inevitably wandered away.

Confession is sometimes seen as a place where we whisper our dirty, little secrets to a priest, who we imagine remembers them as he sees us at Mass or around the parish. This couldn't be further from the truth. Any priest will tell you that hearing confessions is an incredible grace, where good people humble themselves in honesty before the God they love and express how much they wish to be holier, to be better witnesses of Christ, to love the world around them more deeply.

When Pope Francis declared the Extraordinary Jubilee of the Year of Mercy, this sacrament was at the top of his list. He said, "It is important that this moment be linked, first and foremost, to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and to the celebration of the Holy Eucharist with a reflection on mercy." Why? Because mercy is the reason Jesus was born among us. The Merciful Father sent His Son to repair a broken world and to take away our sin so that we could be with them in heaven forever.

In this Year of Mercy, no matter how long it's been since your last Confession, take a moment to experience this incredible grace again, whether it's on a random Tuesday evening in Rosyth or a Saturday in either parish, during an appointment with Fr Kevin, or during a special Lenten reconciliation service.

You will always be glad you did.
