
Prayer to Saint Michael



Mary and Joseph take Jesus to Jerusalem to take part in one of the three pilgrimages (the Passover, Pentecost and the feast of the Tabernacles) prescribed by the Law. During the seven days of the feast, people took part in the cult and listened to the Rabbis who discussed beneath the portico of the Temple. "The boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem", the city the Lord chose for his throne, and where the Temple is found, the only place of worship for the Jews . Jerusalem is the place where "all that was written by the prophets concerning the Son of man will be fulfilled", the place of "his departure" and of his appearances after the resurrection. His parents "sought him" anxiously and troubled. How is it possible to lose a son, not to realise that Jesus is not in the caravan? Is it Christ who has to follow others or vice versa? "Three days later" the "passion" ends and they find Jesus in the Temple, among the doctors, teaching to the amazement of all. The characteristics of his mission begin to unfold and this mission is summarised in the first words that Jesus speaks in Luke's Gospel "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?"

May we take the time to be about God's affairs, now and in the new year!

Stewardship Reflection: "See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are." (1 John 3:1)

During this season of giving, let us remember the most important gift we have received – being children of God. As God's children, it's important that we express our love for others as well. Tell your spouse, children and other family members and friends that you love them, frequently.

Sanctuary of Life: This weekend as we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family, let us ponder that even though he was conceived of a virgin, Jesus nevertheless lived as a son in a human family -- a family which points the way for the rest of us. The family is the sanctuary of life. There can be no life without family, and there can be no family without life. The family, above all, is where life is to be welcomed, no matter how fragile or inconvenient it may be. One of the many reasons why the Pope and bishops identify abortion and euthanasia as pre-eminent issues is because these crimes are committed by one family member upon another. *May the Holy* Family lead us to a Culture of Life!

Epiphany House Blessings: Around January 6, the symbol +C+B+M+ with two numbers before and two numbers after (for example, 20+C+B+M+16) is sometimes seen written in chalk above the doorway of Christian homes. The letters are the initials of the traditional names of the Three Magi: Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. These letters also abbreviate the Latin phrase Christus mansionem benedicat, "May Christ bless the house." The beginning and ending numbers are the year, 2016 in the example above. The crosses represent Christ. Marking the lintels of doorways is an old European practice that originally had overtones of magic (protection of the house). However, the symbols are now used throughout the world and usually represent a traditional Epiphany prayer and blessing. Next weekend, Fr Kevin will bless chalk to be taken home and used in conjunction with the prayers provided in blessing our homes and our families.
