SIXTEENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR (A)

DEAR PARISHIONER,

I am looking forward to seeing many more of you for Holy Mass and in person this weekend. It is hard to believe that our last Mass together was on the Feast of St Joseph 17 weeks ago. Our Vigil Mass on Saturday will mark a big step forward and I want to thank you for your perseverance.

It is important that we try to get back to some sense of normality in the coming days and so I have set out a schedule for the week ahead that takes us some way forward.

Our focus will now shift from providing private prayer to Holy Mass and our volunteers have been briefed on how this will operate in our churches. We are still limited to between 30 and 50 people at Mass but hopefully only for a short time and with the lifting of restrictions we should be back to our usual capacity very soon. It has been difficult to be without Holy Mass in public for so long and I hope a few more days should not be too much of a burden.

Our booking system is up and running using Google Forms for the Sunday Masses, but we should not need to use a booking system at weekday Masses – unless you prove me wrong! Please remember that the Sunday obligation is still suspended and I would encourage you to go to one Mass in the week and keep the weekend available for those who are in full time employment and unable to attend a week day morning Mass.

As stated before, Holy Mass will be simplified to reduce the time we spend in large groups and face coverings will need to worn at all times in church except for children under 5.

We would also ask those who are shielding to continue to follow government guidance and wait for restrictions to be lifted before attending.

If you have booked a seat for Mass it is very important that you get to church early, as your details will be checked at the door and a steward will take you to a designated seat.

Our sincere and grateful thanks go to our volunteers, as without them none of this would be possible.

God bless you all and thank you for your continued prayers and kindness.



Jesus put another parable before the crowds: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While every body was asleep his enemy came, sowed darnel all among the wheat, and made off. When the new wheat sprouted and ripened, the darnel appeared as well. The owner's servants went to him and said, "Sir, was it not good seed that you sowed in your field? If so, where does the darnel come from?" "Some enemy has done this" he answered. And the servants said, "Do you want us to go and weed it out?" But he said, "No, because when you weed out the darnel you might pull up the wheat with it. Let them both grow till the harvest; and at harvest time I shall say to the reapers: First collect the darnel and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barn."

He put another parable before them: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the biggest shrub of all and becomes a tree so that the birds of the air come and shelter in its branches.'

He told them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is like the yeast a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour till it was leavened all through.'

In all this Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables; indeed, he would never speak to them except in parables. This was to fulfil the prophecy:

I will speak to you in parables and expound things hidden since the foundation of the world.

Then, leaving the crowds, he went to the house; and his disciples came to him and said, 'Explain the parable about the darnel in the field to us.' He said in reply, 'The sower of the good seed is the

Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed is the subjects of the kingdom; the darnel, the subjects of the evil one; the enemy who sowed them, the devil; the harvest is the end of the world; the reapers are the angels. Well then, just as the darnel is gathered up and burnt in the fire, so it will be at the end of time. The Son of Man will send his angels and they will gather out of his kingdom all things that provoke offences and all who do evil, and throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth. Then the virtuous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently, Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeper you not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You will need to wear a face covering. Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma. We have a very limited supply of masks if you do not have your own.

COVID-19 & OUR

- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving. This will be provided. Please avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)
- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed and only one reading, psalm and the gospel.
- Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
- Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- pass keepers, and 2 or 3 cleaners for each Mass. Please consider volunteering your time and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

DID YOU KNOW.....

- The name "Christian" and "Catholic," used to refer to the followers of Jesus of Nazareth, and both came from the town of Antioch in Syria at very early dates. (See Acts 11:26 and Ignatius of Antioch's letter to the Smyrnaeans, ch. 8).
- Adrian, or Hadrian IV (Nicholas Breakspear), is the only English-born pope (so far) reigning from 1154-1159. (*There has not been a Scottish born Pope—yet!*)
- The oldest liturgy still in use is the Liturgy of St. James, believed to have been composed in its final form sometime in the 4th century.
 - The word "monstrance," also known as an "ostensorium," comes from the Latin word meaning "to show." (*monstrare* to point out, show; *ostendere* to hold out, show, display; to expose).
 - Popes Francis and Benedict XVI frequently cite or cited the apocalyptic book "Lord of the World" by Robert Hugh Benson, a convert to Catholicism. It was published in 1907, but

is extremely current and at times eerily predicative. In fact, it just so happens to take place in our current decade of the twenty-teens.

Domino's Pizza founder, Tom Monaghan, is a practicing Catholic and founder of the Ave Maria
Foundation, Ave Maria School of Law, Ave Maria University, and the town of Ave Maria, FL.
 I'm surprised he didn't create a pizza named the "Ave Maria" topped with extra-virgin olive oil

and angel hair pasta. (<—Okay, that was pretty bad. But c'mon!)

- The first book ever printed by Gutenberg was the bible in 1454 or 1455. All the bibles he printed included the Deuterocanonicals later removed by Protestants.
- If Jorge Mario Bergoglio, who reportedly came in second in votes in the 2005 conclave that elected Joseph Ratzinger, would have been chosen at that time, he would have taken the name "John XXIV"

rather than "Francis."

NEWS & EVENTS

Ordinations: please remember in your prayers Brother Sam Burke OP of St Albert's Parish in Edinburgh, who will be ordained to the Priesthood of Jesus Christ this coming Saturday, in our cathedral, for the Dominican Order. Please also remember in your prayers Robert Taylor and Martin Eckersley who will be ordained to the transitional diaconate a week on Saturday, in the cathedral, for service in our archdiocese, and please God will be ordained priests next year.

Church halls: these remain closed at the present time until advised by the Archbishop that it is safe to open them up.

Parish Groups: currently remain suspended during this period also.

Time of private prayer: now that the public celebration of the Mass has been allowed, we will stop the periods of private prayer, to cut down on the time in church—and yes, I know that sounds wrong, but so is dying on a contagious virus!

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



Eusabius...No, not Eusébio the famous Portuguese footballer!
Eusabius (c. AD 260-339) was a Bishop of the early Christian Church and lived most of his life in Caesarea in Palestine, although he got about a bit and sometimes didn't see eye to eye with some of his fellow Bishops. You'll be

realising by now that this is a scholarly paper that's being penned this week and I only mentioned the footballer to catch the men's eye.

So, back to Eusabius, he is important because his recorded account of the early Church is the only surviving historical record of those first 300 years of Christianity and its struggle to survive. He also backed up his account of events with extensive quotations from original sources.

We also have the document named the *Didache* which is one of the earliest Christian documents which provides practical instructions on how a Christian community should function and provides some unique insights into how the early Christians lived and Chapter Nine describes a Eucharistic Prayer.

So, why the history lesson? Well, what I'm pointing out is, after being at Mass this week for the first time since the Feast of St Joseph, our Catholic Church has survived from Christ to the present day by adapting to circumstances and external forces. Just as God planned! Yes, our liturgy has changed and at the moment we are not using the Creed or the Gloria but that does not invalidate the Mass in any way. We have to act and dress differently so that we can attend the Eucharistic Feast and although an inconvenience

it does not deprive us of the Spiritual gift which the Mass and the Eucharist provide.

The Sunday Obligation has been lifted at the moment by our Bishops and we are being asked to spread ourselves out a bit by attending Mass just once a week on any day. Everything that is being done is for our safety and wellbeing so that we don't become Saints before our time!

The Mass is back, slightly changed but have a look at the Mass as described by Saint Justin Martyr (c. AD 100-165)(Full description available at https://aleteia.org/2017/04/13/what-was-mass-like-for-the-early-christians/):

'And on the day called Sunday, all who live in cities or in the country gather together to one place, and the memoirs [letters] of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as time permits; then, when the reader has ceased, the president [the presiding priest or bishop] verbally instructs, and exhorts to the imitation of these good things. Then we all rise together and pray, and, as we before said, when our prayer is ended, bread and wine and water are brought, and the president in like manner offers prayers and thanksgivings, according to his ability, and the people assent, saying Amen; and there is a distribution to each, and a participation of that over which thanks have been given, and to those who are absent a portion is sent by the deacons.'

Sometimes we have to look to the past to illuminate the future. The essence of the Mass has never changed in over 2000 years, we abide by the instructions of Christ. "Take this and eat for this is my body.... Take this and drink for this is my blood, the blood of the Covenant, poured out for many" and we are sustained.
