A DOG IS LEFT BARKING OUTSIDE IN A SMALL GARDEN

whilst the owners are out at work all day. A small boy spends his afternoons kicking a ball against an end terrace whilst the owners sit inside with gritted teeth. A new person joins a busy workplace but spends most of his or her time checking out Facebook on the company computer. What do we do about it? Perhaps we stay quiet hoping the problem will go away. Perhaps we tell ourselves that it's none of our business and turn a blind eye. At best we might contact someone in authority and make an anonymous complaint. Speaking face to face with the person that has offended us is probably the most difficult option.

We can often fight shy of confrontation. We do this for all sorts of reasons. Perhaps we want to stay popular and would prefer to preserve an outward show of friendship even though we are seething inside. Perhaps we dodge confrontation because we are afraid of having a row, or worse, afraid of losing a row. Our fears and insecurities lead us to behave less than honestly. Instead of confronting someone who has offended us directly, we procrastinate, beat about the bush, pretend it isn't really a problem, complain bitterly to anyone who will listen, or worse, we erupt with sudden frustration and anger out of all proportion to the original offence.

In Matthew's gospel we are given some straightforward advice on handling a grievance. Firstly, we should approach the person who has offended us in private and voice our concerns. In this way the dispute may be very quickly and very happily sorted out. But if the dispute cannot be sorted out in this way, then we should call on the help of a third party. A third party can often shed light where there was none before. A third party can see or suggest things that haven't previously been considered. A third party usually has the benefit of lending an opinion without anger or bias. It might seem like a lot of trouble to go to, to resolve a grievance, but sometimes a 'nipping it in the bud' approach can save a much greater grievance somewhere further down the line. How many people have allowed abuse, deception, injustice and even holocaust because they have kept quiet and avoided confrontation?

Saint Paul lends us some sound advice. "Love is the one thing that cannot hurt your neighbour." If we approach conflict with love and a genuine desire to put something right we have nothing to fear. To do nothing in the face of wrongdoing is not an option.

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently, Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeperyou will not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You are legally obliged to wear a face covering.

 Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma.
- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving. This will be provided. Please

avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)

- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed and only one reading, psalm and the gospel.
- Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
- For holy Communion, please keep your face covering in place when you receive Holy Communion, and then step to the side, remove mask, consume and replace mask.
- Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- pass keepers, and 2 or 3 cleaners for each Mass. Please consider volunteering your time and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



It's the week leading up to Christmas in the early 1980's and in the small Scottish town there are two rough sleeping itinerants. It's the early hours of the morning, the snow is falling and it is bitterly cold... suddenly the radio on the Police Constable's label squeaks out an alert with the report that two

men are smashing shop windows on the High Street.

On arrival at the Crime Scene the young Cops find two scruffy, cold and tired elderly men. There is a small window broken at one of the shops and both men are holding bricks which they drop as soon as the Police arrived. Just for good measure both men start verbally abusing the Police but with no real intent although they spice up their comments which some colourful language. The men are arrested and transport is called up.

On arrival at the Police Station the Gentlemen of the Road are presented to the Duty Sergeant and the story of their misdemeanour told. The Sergeant accepts that a crime has been committed and both men are taken to the cells to appear at the Sheriff Court in the morning.

Up in the canteen at meal time the Sergeant tells the Probationer Constables about the men they have arrested and gives a brief history of their lives. Just for the antecedents in the report you understand.

In Court the Duty Solicitor is assigned to the case and the Custodies are called and placed in the Dock. The Sheriff asks for their pleas. Both men plead guilty and the Sheriff asks for a copy of Previous Convictions and a long-range weather forecast. Somewhat surprised the Clerk of Court finds a forecast and presents it to the Sheriff.

Eyeing the men sternly the Sheriff tells them "You are rogues and vagabonds! Men of numerous petty convictions. Not good enough, not good enough!" and sentences them to twenty-eight days in prison.

That was a quick summary of the Scottish Court and legal system. Does it relate to todays Gospel? Well, it does actually! If someone does something wrong in this country the first port of call is Mediation, try and talk things out. If that doesn't work the witnesses are called and the evidence examined then it is reported to the Community, that is the Court and if the person in the wrong is found to be guilty of a complaint they are excommunicated from the community, that is they are sent to prison.

So, you can see how the words of Jesus guide our courts and manages disputes in our own communities in these modern times.

Hold on though, what about the last sentence in the Reading, "For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them". How could that happen in a Scottish Court? Would our God of love and compassion guide the legal system?

Here's the rest of the Story:

Returning to duty the next night the young Officer looked up the Court sheets and was stunned to see that his custodies got twenty-eight days each. He spoke to the Sergeant after the start of the shift about his concerns. Smiling, the experienced Cop explained that both men were well known to the Police and the Courts they never caused any real problems except through drink and their crimes were mostly alcohol related. Despite the best efforts of all the Agencies concerned with their social well being the men were staunch friends and much preferred their present lifestyle. Every year about this time both men committed a similar offence and both appeared in Court together.

The legal teams knew the story, as did the Sheriff, and they knew the men were trying to get off the streets before winter's harshest days came to bear.

So, when the Sheriff came to sentencing the men, he called for a weather report, saw the period of severe weather and jailed the pals accordingly.

God works in mysterious ways!
