TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME (A)

ON READING OR HEARING TODAY'S GOSPEL STORY

of the merciless servant, each one of us would rightly judge him a mean, low type of man, a heartless man, who puts himself outside the pale of mercy. He throttled his fellow-servant for a paltry debt of ten dollars, and would not listen to the poor man's plea for mercy. When we hear what the king did to this heartless servant we heartily approve and say: "It served him right, he got what he richly deserved."

We had better stop and think for a moment today and reflect that we ourselves may be that merciless servant described in the parable. Every time we have sinned mortally we have incurred an unpayable debt to God. Each time we have received absolution we have come out of God's courtroom as free men. A weight greater than a million dollar debt has been lifted from our shoulders. A fate worse than generations of earthly imprisonment — that is, eternal slavery — has been spared us because of God's loving, infinite mercy. How then can it happen that we could be so heartless, mean, and foolish as to refuse to forgive a neighbour for some offense he has committed against us?

Yet it happens, and it may be that there are some among us here today who continue to have enmity in their hearts against neighbours who offended them. In their hard-heartedness they cannot get themselves to forgive and forget. Are these not following in the footsteps of the merciless servant? Will they not receive the punishment of the merciless servant — a punishment richly deserved? This will be the fate of all unforgiving Christians; they will meet an unforgiving God when they are called to settle their accounts.

That day has not yet come for us. We still have time to put our affairs in order. We still can forgive all our enemies from our heart. If we do not, we are cutting ourselves off from the possibility of having our own sins and offenses forgiven by God. We have the solemn word of our divine Lord for this in the lesson he draws from the parable "So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you (that is, deliver us up to eternal slavery) if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First reading Ecclesiasticus 27:33-28:9

Forgive your neighbour the hurt he does you; and when you pray, your sins will be forgiven

Resentment and anger, these are foul things, and both are found with the sinner.

He who exacts vengeance will experience the vengeance of the Lord, who keeps strict account of sin. Forgive your neighbour the hurt he does you, and when you pray, your sins will be forgiven.

If a man nurses anger against another, can he then demand compassion from the Lord? Showing no pity for a man like himself, can he then plead for his own sins?

Mere creature of flesh, he cherishes resentment; who will forgive him his sins?

Remember the last things, and stop hating, remember dissolution and death, and live by the commandments.

Remember the commandments, and do not bear your neighbour ill-will; remember the covenant of the Most High, and overlook the offence. *The word of the Lord*.

The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy.

My soul, give thanks to the Lord all my being, bless his holy name. My soul, give thanks to the Lord and never forget all his blessings.

It is he who forgives all your guilt, who heals every one of your ills, who redeems your life from the grave, who crowns you with love and compassion.

His wrath will come to an end; he will not be angry for ever. He does not treat us according to our sins nor repay us according to our faults.

To be forgiven, you must forgive

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times.

'And so the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet. "Give me time" he said "and I will pay the whole sum." And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. "Pay what you owe me" he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, "Give me time and I will pay you." But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him. "You wicked servant," he said "I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow servant just as I had pity on you?" And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how my heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'

DEVOTIONAL LIFE & PRAYER

The Month of September is dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrow:

Since the 16th century Catholic piety has assigned entire months to special devotions. Due to her feast day on September 15, the month of September has traditionally been set aside to honour Our Lady of Sorrows. All the sorrows of Mary (the prophecy of Simeon, the three days' loss, etc.) are merged in the supreme suffering at the Passion. In the Passion, Mary suffered a martyrdom of the heart because of Our Lord's torments and the greatness of her love for Him. "She

her love for Him. "She it was," says Pope Pius XII, "who immune from all sin, personal or inherited, and ever more closely united with her Son, offered Him on Golgotha to the Eternal Father together with the holocaust of her maternal rights and motherly love. As a new Eve, she made

this offering for all the children of Adam contaminated through his unhappy fall. Thus she, who was the mother of our Head according to the flesh, became by a new title of sorrow and glory the spiritual mother of all His members."

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently, Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeperyou will not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You are legally obliged to wear a face covering.

 Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma.
- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving. This will be provided. Please

avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)

- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed and only one reading, psalm and the gospel.
- Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
- For holy Communion, please keep your face covering in place when you receive Holy Communion, and then step to the side, remove mask, consume and replace mask.
- Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- We will need a team of at least 2
 pass keepers, and 2 or 3
 cleaners for each Mass. Please
 consider volunteering your time
 and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

DO YOU REMEMBER.....

It was exactly 10 years ago this week that for ten hours, the first and last Papal State visit took



place in Scotland. On a cold but sunny Feast of St Ninian (16th September), the Papal Plane—'Good Shepherd One'landed at Edinburgh airport, where Pope Benedict XVI was met by HRH the Duke of Edinburgh o behalf of Her Majesty the Queen, and Cardinal O'Brien representing the local Catholic Church.

The Papal entourage made their way from Turnhouse to Holyrood House, the official residence of the queen in Scotland, where an audience was held and an exchange of

gifts between the two heads of state took place.

Once the audience was

over, the Pope Mobile made it's way through Edinburgh, along Princes Street, which was lined by thousands of people who eagerly awaited a chance to greet the Vicar of Christ, before the cavalcade arrived at St Benet's, the official residence of the Archbishop's of St Andrews & Edinburgh, where the Holy Father after greeting pupils from the local St Peter's Primary School, had a short rest and took lunch with the Bishop's of Scotland.





Whilst these events were happening in Edinburgh, Glasgow was seeing bus after bus of pilgrims arriving at Bellahouston Park, and turning the nearby motorway into a giant bus park! Again, thousands upon thousands of people, Catholics and non Catholics filled into the park in preparation for the wonderful celebration of the Holy Sacrifice of the

Mass presided over by the Pope. The same park in which in 1982 Pope

John Paul II had celebrated Mass during his pastoral visit.

Holy Mass was a wonderful experience, as the winter sun was slowly setting upon the sanctuary and the Holy Father imparted his Apostolic blessing, before heading to Glasgow airport and flying down to London to continue his time in the UK.

NEWS & EVENTS

Special Collection for the Aged & Infirm Clergy: a special collection will be held this weekend for the retired priests of our archdiocese. *Please use one of the diocesan Gift Aid envelope available at the back of the churches for this purpose, if you are a tax payer. If you do not pay tax, please also make use of the blue envelopes, but do not fill in the details. That way we know the money is part of that collection.*

Visits to the Sick: unfortunately we have still not been given the go ahead to start visiting the sick and bringing Holy Communion to them as yet. I know that this is not ideal, but the clergy and lay ministers would not want to be the cause of spreading any infections from one house to the next. Obviously in cases of extreme nature, Fr Kevin will attend.

1st Minister's Statement: Nothing that has been advised by the Scottish Government of late effects our Churches and the celebration of Mass. *The next review is expected on the 1st October*.

Church halls: these remain closed at the present time until advised by the Archbishop that it is safe to open them up.

Parish Groups: currently remain suspended during this period also.

Time of private prayer: now that the public celebration of the Mass has been allowed, we will stop the periods of private prayer, to cut down on the time in church—and yes, I know that sounds wrong, but so is dying of a contagious virus!

Parish First Holy Communion celebrations: because of the on going pandemic and the closure of our churches, the scheduled celebrations have been provisionally moved to the following dates after consultation with the senior management teams in our parish schools: Our Lady of Lourdes Church (St Margaret's PS) - Saturday 7th November at 11am & Ss John & Columba's Church (St John's PS) - Saturday 21st November at 10am.



This parable goes far beyond personal problems. The world needs, above all, the forgiveness of God, and those who seek a more just society will not achieve it through accusations and pointing the finger.

In this life we have to learn to accept the repentant sinner and offer forgiveness and welcome them with joy when we are reconciled.

Do you think that goes for the puppy too?
