TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME (A)

DO WE FONDLY IMAGINE THAT PEOPLE OUGHT TO LOVE US JUST THE WAY WE ARE?

We are told often enough that God loves us warts and all. But do we carry this belief through life with not much thought of betterment?

In today's parable a king invites guests to his son's wedding. When the guests refuse to turn up, the king extends the invitation to a different set of guests, both good and bad. The guests fill the wedding hall, but as they do so, the king notices one man not wearing a wedding robe and he has him bound hand and foot and thrown out into the darkness! The consequences for not wearing the right outfit seem overly harsh as far as this poor guest is concerned, but of course the parable has not really very much to do with wedding receptions and even less to do with wearing the right tie. The overriding theme in this story is to do with standards.

Jesus explains that the Kingdom of God is open to all but that doesn't mean that anyone and everyone can stroll into heaven. Just as guests make an effort to be correctly dressed for a wedding, so too must we put in the preparation and effort to be accepted into God's Kingdom.

The guest who was thrown out of the wedding feast for his cavalier 'accept me just the way I am' attitude presents a warning for us all. Too often we go about our daily routines not feeling any need to live life better. Far too often we look on our Christianity as making choices between good and evil, and we are confident that we rarely choose evil. But Jesus is asking more of us than simply choosing between right and wrong, he is asking us to choose between good and an even greater good. What we imagine is our 'best' very rarely is.

Just as the guest in today's parable did little more than turn up to the wedding, so we live life going through the motions but not much more. Accepting God's invitation to join him is only the first step, it's how we live out that acceptance that really matters.

Invite everyone you can to the wedding Jesus began to speak to the chief priests and elders of the people in parables: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding." But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He despatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town. Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out on to the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests. When the king came in to look at the guests he noticed one man who was not wearing a wedding garment, and said to him, "How did you get in here, my friend, without a wedding garment?" And the man was silent. Then the king said to the attendants, 'Bind him hand and foot and throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'



Pope John XXIII (1881 - 1963)



Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was born in the village of Sotto il Monte, near Bergamo, in 1881. At the age of 11 he entered the seminary at Bergamo and later pursued his studies at the Pontifical Seminary in Rome. He was ordained priest in 1904. He was secretary to the Bishop of Bergamo but from 1921 onwards he served the Holy See directly in various posts, both in Rome and in Bulgaria, Turkey and Greece, culminating as Apostolic Nuncio to France from 1944 until 1953, when he was created cardinal and made the Patriarch of Venice. He was elected Pope in 1958. He convoked the Roman Synod, instituted the revision of Canon Law, and called the Second Vatican Council, which opened on 11 October 1962. He died while the Council was still in session, on the evening of 3 June 1963.

Saint Kenneth (515-599)



Saint Cainnech of Aghaboe is also known as Saint Canice in Ireland, Saint Kenneth in Scotland, Saint Kenny and in Latin Saint Canicus. He was an Irish abbot, monastic founder, priest and missionary.

He was born in 515 or 516, at Glengiven, near Dungiven in Ireland. He spent his early years watching his chieftain's flocks.

In 565 he joined Columba in Scotland. He built a church in the place now known as Saint Andrews and also a monastery in Fife on the banks of the Eden. He is recorded as having carried out missionary work in central Fife also.

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently, Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeperyou will not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You are legally obliged to wear a face covering.

 Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma.
- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving. This will be provided. Please

avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)

- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed and only one reading, psalm and the gospel.
- Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
- For holy Communion, please keep your face covering in place when you receive Holy Communion, and then step to the side, remove mask, consume and replace mask.
- Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- We will need a team of at least 2
 pass keepers, and 2 or 3
 cleaners for each Mass. Please
 consider volunteering your time
 and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

NEWS & EVENTS

Obligation to attend Mass: The Bishop's have as yet not reinstated the obligation and so as we approach the colder weather, it may be good to remind ourselves that doors and windows of the churches must be kept open for air flow, and so we advise either dress for winter, or perhaps stay at home and watch online...

Weekday Masses: There will be no weekday Masses this coming week or the following week until Thursday 22nd October. Next weekend Masses will be supplied by Fr Samuel Burke OP, Dominican priest and chaplain to Edinburgh University.

Visits to the Sick: unfortunately we have still not been given the go ahead to start visiting the sick and bringing Holy Communion to them as yet. I know that this is not ideal, but the clergy and lay ministers would not want to be the cause of spreading any infections from one house to the next. Obviously in cases of extreme nature, Fr Kevin will attend.

Parish First Holy Communion celebrations: because of the on going pandemic and the closure of our churches, the scheduled celebrations have been provisionally moved to the following dates after consultation with the senior management teams in our parish schools: Our Lady of Lourdes Church (St Margaret's PS) - Saturday 7th November at 10am & 1130am & Ss John & Columba's Church (St John's PS) - Saturday 21st November at 10am. Due to the government restrictions, we are only allowed 50 people in church at at time, therefore in OLOL, we will hold 2 Masses. At each of the 3 Masses, there will be enough space for a child, plus 4 family members only. Further details will be made available nearer the time.

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



Organising a family shin-dig, especially a large event takes a lot of planning and organising. Such was the case with a young couple in the Parish when they started to organise their Marriage some time ago. Initially they planned a small wedding ceremony on a romantic Mediterranean island

with a small group of friends attending.

Things were dramatically changed with just weeks to go when the island of their dream was excluded from travelling to and from the United Kingdom. Suddenly everything had to go to overdrive.

Thankfully members of the Parish rallied round and what was almost a disaster turned into a wonderful occasion.

With the Government Covid restrictions the guest list became immensely small and a lot of hard choices had to be made as to who could attend the ceremony. However, for these youngsters it was all about the Sacrament of Marriage and not the wedding party afterwards.

The same could be said for the up and coming First Holy Communion Services that will take place in the Parish soon. Both schools were organised and ready to go as normal during May and June but then the churches were closed and disappointed children had to be consoled. Happily, we are ready again for that big day in the children's lives when they will meet Jesus in the Sacrament as they receive their First Holy Communion. Despite restrictions we will strive to make this a great occasion and as the young couple said; it is the Sacrament that is the important aspect of the occasion.

And so, to the Church and her community as we enjoy a renewal and as we return to a slightly different awakening which involves much planning and organisation. We are witnessing full attendance at Mass despite the limited places available both on Sundays and during the week. The only thing that is regrettable is that some folk are booking and then when they can't make it forget to cancel. It's not easy turning someone away from a Church door, especially older members the community who don't have access to a computer or smart phone. We're trying hard to save a space for such as those since they have

been our backbone for so long.

Today, we have Jesus telling us of a great wedding feast and this is a parable of two parts. In the first part God invites us to a great banquet where there is a place for everyone. Throughout the history of the Jewish Nation God had been sending prophets to the people but God's message was ignored, as was Jesus.

The King would not be thwarted though and he sent out messengers (the Apostles) to other Nations (crossroads) so that the Gentiles and pagans may enter the Church. The King is celebrating the wedding of his son, Christ, who we call the bridegroom (Mk 2:19) as he became one body with humankind.

As we meet for the Eucharist Feast, we must remember what Christ is saying here today.

So, as we attend Mass, we should remember that God is calling us to use our daily lives as a preparation for that great banquet held by him for all humankind. What are we supposed to do? We're supposed to unite and reconcile all Nations (and indeed communities). If we don't that group of comfortable Christians will diminish and others will be called to take charge of the work of God.

The second part of the parable highlights this: You, the Christians already inside the Church, do you wear the new garment – a life of justice and trustworthiness and honesty?

The alternative is to be the silent guest who is not properly dressed. Remember at this time in history the host supplies the wedding attire.

Silence purposely rejects the hand that God offers you.
