SOLEMNITY OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE (A)

IF WE ARE HONEST NONE OF US RELISH THE IDEA OF JUDGMENT OR ACCOUNTABILITY.

Perhaps we have this uncomfortable feeling that we are not really doing all we could or all we should. The even more frightening realisation is that if we suspect we are not doing all we could we probably aren't!

On the Day of Judgment, we will be assembled and the good will be told "Inherit the Kingdom prepared for you I was hungry and you gave me food, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me." The criteria for final judgement is crystal clear, we will be simply judged on very simple acts of love and compassion. We are asked to see Jesus in the beggar on the street, the starving children on our TV sets, the refugees in our city hostels and the sick or vulnerable people in our parishes and communities. It sounds easy, so why do we so often fail to respond?

We fail to respond to need, when we find it difficult to share our resources or our time. We fail to respond when we cannot recognise need or when we jump onto some kind of moral high ground. We fail to respond when we are so wrapped in our own lives that opportunities to recognise need in others simply passes us by. Worst of all, we fail to respond when we simply can't be bothered.

Today's gospel is like a sneak preview of an exam paper, but having a sneak preview isn't enough, if we want to pass the test, we need to respond to the needy on a daily basis in order to recognise Jesus in our lives.

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order: Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him. After that will come the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, having done away with every sovereignty, authority and power. For he must be king *until he has put all his enemies under his feet* and the last of the enemies to be

destroyed is death, for everything is to be *put under his feet*. And when everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will be subject in his turn to the One who subjected all things to him, so that God may be all in all.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right hand and the goats on his left.

'Then the King will say to those on his right hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me, sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and make you welcome; naked and clothe you; sick or in prison and go to see you?" And the King will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you did this to one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me."

'Next he will say to those on his left hand, "Go away from me, with your curse upon you, to the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you never gave me food; I was thirsty and you never gave me anything to drink; I was a stranger and you never made me welcome, naked and you never clothed me, sick and in prison and you never visited me." Then it will be their turn to ask, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty, a stranger or naked, sick or in prison, and did not come to your help?" Then he will answer, "I tell you solemnly, in so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me."

November is the Month of the Holy Souls

This Sunday we'll enter the month November, the month in which the Church prays for all who are in the purifying fires of Purgatory, waiting for the day when they will join the company of the saints in heaven. The celebration of Mass is the highest means the Church can provide for charity for the dead, but we can also relieve their sufferings through our prayers, sufferings and penances. We can also help the Poor Souls by doing acts and prayers that have indulgences attached to them. There are many indulgences, applicable only to the Souls in Purgatory, which can be obtained during the month of November.

The Holy Souls Masses:

During November we offer Masses for the dead. If you would like to enrol a loved one on the Parish November Mass List, they will have Mass offered for them, they will be included in the Masses for the Holy Souls, and they will be prayed for (collectively) during the Intercessions every day. Holy Souls Mass offering envelopes are available in all three churches this week or so. Please return Mass offerings to Fr Kevin.

November Lists: Please collect a sheet from one of our churches and fill in the names of all whom you wish to be remembered in prayer during our Holy Souls Mass in this month of November, and return them to the burse/basket at the front of the altar.

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently, Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeperyou will not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You are legally obliged to wear a face covering.

 Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma.
- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving. This will be provided. Please

avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)

- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed.
 - Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
 - For holy Communion, please keep your face covering in place when you receive Holy Communion, and then step to the side, remove mask, consume and replace mask.
 - Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- pass keepers, and 2 or 3 cleaners for each Mass. Please consider volunteering your time and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



Hogmanay! Growing up on the west coast of Scotland Hogmanay was always a special day, and full of special traditions. The house had to be scrubbed from bottom to top and everything had to be put in place for the ending of the year and the approach of the new. A buffet would be laid out with much emphasis

being laid at the door of sweet or sugary things. There would be shortbread and Madera cake, Dundee cake or dumpling which used up all the dried fruit and sometimes little tokens or silver thruppennies would be baked into the 'clootie'. Sausage rolls and savoury things of fond memory would have a place on the table as would the bottle of whisky to offer the anticipated First-footers a wee dram. Fruit cordial for the 'weans' was on hand too. Everyone had to be dressed in their finest.

The celebrations always started by watching the White Heather Club on the BBC, a live show hosted by Any Stewart, the performers embracing the tradition of offering each other a dram at the 'Bells' and it didn't take long for the entire cast to be on the falling down stage of being merry.

There was always a reflection on things good and bad gone bye in the course of the year. Then at the end of the celebrations Andy and the Dancers would sing: "Haste ye back, we love you dearly, Call again you're welcome here. May your days be free from sorrow, And your friends be ever near. May the paths o'er which you wander, Be to you a joy each day. Haste ye back we love you dearly, Haste ye back on friendship's way".

That was the signal for the house parties to begin!

This Sunday is the last Sunday in Ordinary Time, perhaps we could say the Church's Hogmanay, and it is also the Feast of Christ the King, a solemnity instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925 confirming the consubstantiality of Christ with the Father.

At Baptism each of us was anointed by the Priest with holy oil, as priest, prophet and king. So, today's feast is a good time to reflect on our own kingship and what 'King' means and how to be one. If we understand the feast then we can understand our own call better.

A possible example of how God wants to treat us can be found in Genesis; Adam sits in State and God brings him all the animals for him to give them names. Now, to give names to all of one's subjects is the act of a king. But the duties of a king don't stop with a naming ceremony, indeed they only just begin and by adopting and naming these creatures comes the duty of responsibility to care for them.

This is the reason why we are obliged to act as the custodians of creation, a responsibility which no other creature holds.

How far that duty extends can be then visualised in Christ, the King of the Universe, who is at one and the same time the ruler of all and the servant of all.

As we approach Advent, our Christian New Year, might we reflect on the past year and all it's good and bad points. We could also reflect on our personal role in life, our Kingship, by asking ourselves "Who are my subjects and over whom am I, personally king?" which leads us to a second question: "Whom am I called to serve?"

Our stewardship will be examined when we are called to judgement. All the enquiry described in today's Gospel as to how we treated others will be asked of us, not collectively, but individually.

Hmmm, I wonder... Will we be able to 'First-foot' heaven on that day?
