SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT (B)

APART FROM PEOPLE WHO BUILD MOTORWAYS,

most of us have no idea of the enormous amount of work involved in shifting huge swathes of earth to make way for a new road. Clearing a path and making the route straight is quite a task, and it's soon forgotten by the motorist who expects the roads to run smoothly.

So clearing a path is something which most of us get round to only once a year, and even then it's only a few yards of paving stone outside the back kitchen!

This gives us a false sense of security in Advent when we are repeatedly told to clear the path for the coming of the Lord. We can end up thinking that it's just some minor chore which we will get round to and which won't take us long to polish off. But, in fact, preparing the way for the Lord is motorway stuff. It's no mere spring-cleaning. It's not tidying the garden. It's about a constant, deep-digging, dirt-removing look at the way we live our lives. It demands a willingness to recognise where we have gone off the track, and a determination to do something about it.

To be baptised by John the Baptist was a life changing decision. To be baptised in Jesus Christ is to play with fire and the Holy Spirit. And to renew our baptismal fervour in Advent is the only real way to prepare for Christmas.

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently, Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeperyou will not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You are legally obliged to wear a face covering.

 Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma.
- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving. This will be provided. Please

avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)

- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed.
 - Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
 - For holy Communion, please keep your face covering in place when you receive Holy Communion, and then step to the side, remove mask, consume and replace mask.
 - Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- We will need a team of at least 2
 pass keepers, and 2 or 3
 cleaners for each Mass. Please
 consider volunteering your time
 and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



The snow fell this week and the Christmas trees and lights went up in many houses as we attempt to bring a little cheer into this extraordinary year with an extended Christmas Season. We see the hope that Christmas and all that it means brings to Christians around the world. A child is

to be born... A child with a story like no other.

If we dig out our Bible and in some cases dust them off, we can turn to the Gospel of Luke where, one day and one chapter at a time starting on the first day of December we can read the story of Jesus the Christ. The Gospel readings will finish on Christmas Eve and before we offer presents to each other we will know why this baby was born.

But who was Luke? Who was the man behind this particular Gospel and who was he writing for? The second part of the question is answered by the man himself. He was writing for a sponsor named Theophilus who may have been a well to do Christian. This was a common custom of the time and it would be expected that the dedicated work would be copied and the resultant scrolls circulated to Christian communities.

Luke was probably a Greek from Antioch; a disciple of Saint Paul, who calls him 'the beloved physician', a Gentile convert who became a missionary.

The writings are noted for the characteristics typical of classical historical methods and the intended audience was primarily Gentile converts to Christianity. Luke makes use of Mark's writings as source material and he tells us of the way in which Paul transmitted the customs and beliefs from the first Christian community, and how the facts were passed on. Also, there is a special place for Mary and her role in her Son's ministry.

So, Luke not only tells us about the life of Christ but he also records the life of the early Church in the Acts of the Apostles (Academic note: The writings were probably written between A.D.70 and 85... see me!!! Wait for the Quiz night!). Put together the Gospel and Acts form a unified statement of God's acts in salvation history, with all His promises to Israel fulfilled in the life of Jesus and the life of the Church.

Interweaved through the life of Jesus are the stories of other prominent figures in the early Church and the message of Christ is reinforced in many ways.

If we look at the Gospel and in particular say the journey of Jesus to Jerusalem we can see a parallel in the Church's mission to the world and all nations as preached by Saint Paul in his journey to Rome as described in Acts with all the emphasis on Jesus being the Son of God and the Son of Man, who brings universal salvation for all of us as realised by Christ through His death and resurrection.

You've just read the story of Luke, now will you read the story of Christ as penned by the Gentle Physician, one chapter a day in the lead up to Christmas... a bedtime story for the children perhaps, adapted for their ages and bringing the family together.

In doing this we can respond to todays Gospel where Mark tells us how John the Baptist announces the coming of the One sent by God, the One who is our Salvation.

So here we are in the second week of Advent preparing for Christmas, buying gifts and food and wine for a slightly diminished celebration. But there is no need to have a diminished Spiritual celebration.

Five minutes a day for the first twenty-four days of December and as we read we can offer a prayer: Day by day, Oh, Dear Lord, Three things I pray, To see thee more clearly, Love thee more dearly, Follow thee more nearly, Day by day.
