IT'S STRANGE BUT TRUE, THAT WE TEND TO LIVE UP TO OTHER PEOPLE'S EXPECTATIONS.

If someone expects very little of us, then it is likely that we will end up achieving next to nothing. Living up to high expectations can feel daunting, but the surprising thing about great expectations, is that very often they have the power to transform us. Living up to great expectations can make us into better people.

In today's gospel, Jesus meets Andrew's brother Simon. He looks at him and says, "You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas, meaning Rock." The new name must have filled Peter's friends with astonishment. "A rock" Peter certainly wasn't. Peter we know was a bit of a hot head. He was impulsive, rash, sometimes misguided and often passionate. To describe him as a 'rock' was surely inappropriate. Yet slowly and surely, Peter starts to live up to Jesus' expectations, and slowly but surely, Peter changes from a hot headed fisherman, into a steadfast leader of the Church. As we see so often in the Bible, Jesus' expectations have the power to transform.



By comparison, we seem to live our lives with fairly banal expectations. Our greatest ambition, as we wake each morning might be to clear our 'in tray' at work, or take the car to the car wash. Are we missing something? Is God calling us to greater things and we simply aren't listening? For each of us God has a job to do. Of each of us God has great expectations. Surely amongst our resolutions for 2021, we must plan how to answer God's call.

'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening'

Samuel was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord. where the ark of God was, when the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' He answered, 'Here I am.' Then he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' Samuel had as yet no knowledge of the Lord and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. Once again the Lord called, the third time. He got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli then understood that it was the Lord who was calling the boy, and he said to Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if someone calls say, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel answered, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.'

Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.

The obligation to attend Mass remains suspended at this time

Public Worship

As from the 15th July we have been able to open our 3 churches, following both the bishop's and the government guidelines.

We will only be able to continue to open our churches if enough parishioners volunteer to assist with the cleaning after each Mass...

- You may attend any weekday Mass, instead of attending the Sunday one;
 - If you are shielding, it's important that you do not come out to Mass at all;
- We will need to record your name and address when you attend Mass, in case you need to be traced;
- We are not allowed more than 50 people in church.
- Seating according to physical distancing rules. Currently,
 Rosyth would have a capacity of 30, Inverkeithing will also be about 30 and Dunfermline is 48. Households may sit together. You will be guided to a seat by a passkeeperyou will not be able to sit where you normally do.
- You are legally obliged to wear a face covering.
 Exemptions are children under 5 and those with a condition such as asthma.
- You will need to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving.

This will be provided. Please avoid touching statues and other surfaces. If you wish to light votive candles, please place them in the basket provided for this purpose (We ask you not to light the candles yourself, as your hands have flammable liquid on them...)

- There will be no music or singing, no readers, ministers of communion, altar servers or sacristans. Only the priest will be allowed in the sacristy and toilet facilities will not be available.
- Mass will be celebrated without the Gloria or Creed.
- Holy Communion (under the one species) will be distributed after the final blessing and people are asked to leave immediately.
- For holy Communion, please keep your face covering in place when you receive Holy Communion, and then step to the side, remove mask, consume and replace mask.
- Offertory donations may be placed in baskets as you leave the church at the end of Mass
- There will be no Teas etc. after Mass.
 - We will suspend the Holy Hours to focus on Mass, until we can resume normal services.
 - The church will have to be cleaned after each Mass.
- We will need a team of at least 2
 pass keepers, and 2 or 3
 cleaners for each Mass. Please
 consider volunteering your time
 and help make this all possible.
 - My thanks to those who are presently volunteering to clean the churches at the end of each period.

NEWS & EVENTS

Bishop's Conference Of Scotland Statement - 05 January 2021

Recognising the dangers posed by the new faster-spreading variant of COVID-19, we note the Scottish Government's decision to close all places of worship <u>from Friday 8</u> January 2021. *

The Scottish Government believes that such measures are necessary to curtail the spread of this new strain during the roll-out of the vaccine. We appreciate the difficult choices facing the Scottish Government at this time and we have shown ourselves ready both to cooperate with and to support its efforts in protecting the common good. This has included curtailing public worship in extreme circumstances and for a limited period.

However, we are also perplexed by the decision, given that the stringent measures taken since last March to ensure public safety in our churches have been effective. No evidence has been forthcoming to justify the inclusion of places of worship as sources of infection. Without such scientific evidence these restrictions will appear to Catholics to be arbitrary and unfair. Moreover, a significant number of other sectors similarly restricted last March alongside public worship – such as construction, manufacturing and elite sports - have now been left free to continue in operation.

We also note that, in England, the essential contribution of public worship to the spiritual welfare of all citizens during this crisis has now been endorsed by the decision not to close places of worship while the Scottish Government has apparently retreated from this view, causing dismay and confusion

We are very aware of the disappointment these closures will cause not only to our own Catholic community, but to many of our fellow-Christians and those of other faiths in Scotland. We wish to emphasise again the spiritual, social and psychological benefits provided by continuing public worship, and we ask for these to be taken into full account in future decisions. Public worship is a human right and is a duty humanity owes to God. More concretely, Catholics need the Eucharist and the Sacramental encounter with the LORD as necessary to their spiritual wellbeing and their ultimate salvation.

While we unequivocally share the common goal of protecting public health, we urge the Scottish Government, when the present measures are reviewed later in January, to reconsider these restrictions in the light of the above concerns.

*Edit: The Scottish Government has since clarified that churches should be closed now.

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



Ian Bradley in his book The Fife Pilgrim Way (In the footsteps of Monks, Miners and Martyrs) suggests "Quasi-monastic communities involving shared disciplines and a communal lifestyle have been one of the main growth areas within western Christianity over the last fifty years or so...As the

Parish system breaks down, it may be that medieval-style monasticism, with its regular discipline of prayer, its collegiality and mutual support and its ministry of pastoral presence and hospitality, provides a possible model for the future of the Church. There are surely lessons to be learned in our increasingly frenzied and atomised society from the principals of balance between action and contemplation, engagement and withdrawal and solitude and community, the rhythm of prayer, meditation and manual labour and the commitment to the common life as opposed to narrow individualism which where at the heart of medieval monasticism. So, there is much for today's pilgrims to ponder as they walk through the ruins of Fife's once mighty abbeys and monasteries (p.109/10)"

Now, that's a lot to digest in one gulp but it is a hard fact of life that the structure of our Catholic parishes is breaking down. Once we had a number of Priests serving in a Church and that has diminished in such a short time to one Priest per Church until the present day where we have one Priest in a Parish made up of several congregations.

Has Mr Bradley hit the nail on the head with his observations? Do we modern day Catholics need to take a long hard look at ourselves and go back to basics?

Archbishop Cushley, as he commenced the sad and hard job of amalgamating congregations, commented at the first meeting in Portobello that the geographical parish was a thing of the past and we now pick a parish of our own choice and we drive to that church each Sunday to attend Mass. The above quote and the memory of the Archbishop's comments set me wondering this week as to where we are going as a Church community after we return to a semi normal life.

To be part of a community means commitment and not just a Sunday visit. Now, if I drive from Fife to attend Mass in the Cathedral in Edinburgh each Sunday and consider the Cathedral to be my 'parish', how am I supposed to support the work of that community except through monetary donation. Can I attend services and social events that bond that community or am I just an outsider looking in? May I suggest the answer to that question is yes and no. Yes, you are an outsider looking in and no you are not a member of that community.

Membership of a Christian community, particularly a Catholic one, needs commitment and that will lead to personal stability and an ever-improving lifestyle. This type of involvement puts the community first as it prays together, evangelises by example and offers hospitality to those in need and it places *Persona Christi* first and man second.

At present, with all the churches closed, the internet facility has let us 'attend Mass' anywhere in the world, it's almost a click and collect service leading to a modern-day Catholic nomad who is never on the same website twice. Will this behaviour continue as we come back to reality?

Catholics are turning into gyrovagues, those who move from congregation to congregation, staying for a few Sunday Masses and then move on just as if they were at a World Buffet sampling food from around the globe but leaving much behind.

Today's Gospel reading tells us of how Jesus, the Christ, gathered folk around himself. These people weren't just punters who would become pals. No, today we see how Jesus selected those he felt capable of forming that community of Disciples who would be the rock-bed on which the Church would be founded. Yes, there would be much troubled water in the journey that established the Church but that is community, that is family and these men stayed the course that saw the Apostles answer the instruction: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations".

Can you commit in the way that Jesus asks? It's not easy and it's not a Sunday only job either, it's a commitment to the congregation you are part of and the way of life that they inspire.
