

FOURTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR (B)

TODAY ST MARK TELLS US HOW JESUS WENT INTO THE SYNAGOGUE AND BEGAN TO TEACH.

He tells us how amazed the people were at how he taught and at the authority in his teachings. His authority was powerful enough to expel demons even. You'll notice that Mark doesn't tell us what Jesus taught, but only how he taught and the impression he made. So why did people sense authority in Jesus' presence, and why was it so compelling?

When we think of authority we tend to think of bosses, leaders or the legal profession. We think of rules, laws and boundaries. We equate authority with enforcement and for the most part we don't like it very much. Perhaps Jesus' brand of authority was compelling because it wasn't any of these things. Jesus' brand of authority wasn't about the exclusion that the scribes and Pharisees were so fond of but of total inclusion. Jesus' authority was routed in the value of every man, woman and child over any out-dated rule or redundant tradition.



We do not have the benefit of listening first hand to Jesus' teaching, but it is testament to his authority that we still read his words twenty centuries after he spoke them. There are still lessons to be learned for those who believe Jesus can add something to our world and change us forever. There are still demons in our lives, and Jesus' teaching still has the authority to drive them out.

Give your undivided attention to the Lord

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord. *The word of the Lord*.

Unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority

Jesus and his disciples went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the sabbath came he went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.


Baptisms & Marriages Arrangements for weddings (for which six months notice is required) and Baptisms should be made by appointment with one of the clergy.

DEACON PAT'S PONDERINGS



"It's as plain as the nose on your face'. Now there is a phrase to conjure with! It also makes you wonder who coined this saying in the first place, obviously someone with a keen sense of observation who took in all that was going on about them and realised that the only folk who didn't realise what was

going on was those who were looking inward and at themselves only.

"They've been flirting all afternoon ... It's as plain as the nose on your face".

So, there is a basic explanation of the saying but we could expand on it by saying "Our churches should be a community... It's as plain as the nose on your face". That being the case I've been condering this week as to what the future holds for our church and our community? Once we come out of the present set of circumstances will we return to Sunday worship on a regular basis or will some of us feel it is adequate to flick the swich on the computer, sit in our PJ's and tune into a Mass.

I know I've banged this drum before and it may start to be annoying, but it is a worry, not only for me as your Deacon but for the whole world's people of Faith. How do we recreate Community? The Dictionary defines community as 'the condition of sharing or having certain attitudes and interests in common'. In our case it is sharing the Christian Faith and the Word of God. Being there for one-another, a support mechanism from the richest (money) to the poorest (again money). Very often we see that when it comes to faith those circumstances are reversed and the opposite is true.

As we read through Scripture and the Gospel's we recognise that the community formed by Jesus was one were everyone was equal and shared the common good. This continued in the writings of the New Testament with the Letters of Paul, James and Peter. In this modern world has our sense of community drifted away in favour of a sense of self? Last Sunday a fellow dog-walker made a socially distanced observation to me in reference to others on the pathway: "What's wrong with people?" she asked and commented

"They can't even say a cheery hello anymore, everyone is plugged into something except each other!"

Can we start to 'plug into' each other now, this Sunday, by picking up the phone and calling someone from our community just to make sure they are doing ok? Do our Seniors need a little help with shopping or technology? Do you have any easy fixes for the difficulties of Home Schooling?

I know it's not the same as meeting for a coffee but making arrangements to meet online with a coffee in hand or a significant other favourite beverage can make all the difference in a tedious day. To be there for each other... in community.

In today's Gospel, Jesus and his seedling community "went into Capenaum; and immediately on the sabbath he entered the synagogue and taught. And they were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as the scribes". In this way Jesus began his public life preaching in a synagogue, preaching a movement of conversion to a new way of life, full of love for each other, a life of community. This was a life alien to the people of the day for theirs was a life of everyman for himself despite the fact that charity was integral to the Law. Suddenly the congregation were "amazed, so that they questioned among themselves, saying, "What is this? A new teaching! With authority he commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." And at once his fame spread everywhere throughout all the surrounding region of Galilee". So Jesus' ministry began.

Yet, it took a demented man to recognise Jesus as the Messiah, the Christ, as he proclaimed: "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? ... I know who you are, the Holy One of God."
